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Highlights 2013

Ntataise receives a GOLD Impumelelo Award at the prestigious Impumelelo Social Innovations Awards ceremony in December. This award is due acknowledgement of the importance of pre-school education and of Ntataise's leading role in the field.

Ntataise Network organisations provide ECD programmes, training and on-site support to 2 839 pre-schools, 4 464 pre-school practitioners reaching 127 952 pre-school aged children.

A record number of delegates and guests attend the Ntataise Network annual conference. The opening of the conference is featured on SABC 2 "Growing Tomorrow".

Ntataise welcomes Golang Kulani, based in the Limpopo province, to the Ntataise Network.

Ntataise launches its new, exciting and informative website (www.ntataise.org).

Baby and toddler playgroup kits are distributed to 14 ECD NGOs.

Parent run playgroups are established on six farms surrounding Viljoenskroon. Ntataise equips each of these playgroups with educational toys and equipment.

Ntataise equips 65 playrooms in the Free State and North West province with educational toys and equipment.





Ntataise - 33 years in early childhood development

Ntataise meaning to lead a young child by the hand is an independent, not-for-profit organisation founded in South Africa in 1980 to help women in disadvantaged rural communities gain the knowledge and skills needed to establish and sustain Early Childhood Development (ECD) programmes. Over the years Ntataise's training and development work has spread from farm worker communities to towns and villages. Today Ntataise's work is divided between its training and development programme in the Free State and its national Network capacity building and support programme.

Ntataise Network

One of Ntataise's greatest success stories is the development and growth of a Network which includes some of South Africa's leading ECD training organisations. This Network has been developed over 20 years and has made its mark in areas where there would otherwise be no ECD provision for young children. Today the Network has become one of the strongest of its kind in the country and its 18 self-sufficient and independent member organisations span seven of South Africa's nine provinces. Ntataise offers the Network accredited training programmes which include learning and resource materials, assessment and moderation systems. Ntataise also runs a comprehensive training programme for Network members. It offers organisational development and capacity building support and mentoring to directors of Network organisations. Above all it provides a forum which allows its members to keep abreast of and influence developments in the national ECD field.

Ntataise's Free State operations

Ntataise's work in the Free State has spread from establishing pre-schools on farms in Viljoenskroon to training and supporting women involved in ECD programmes (both centre and home-based) in an increasing number of towns in the northern Free State and surrounding areas. Ntataise Free State's training and development programmes work directly with pre-schools, practitioners, children, parents and communities with a pivotal focus on the child.

Reach

Through its programmes Ntataise has empowered thousands of women who in turn have reached over 500 000 children in some of South Africa's most disadvantaged areas. These programmes have had a considerable impact on ECD in South Africa and significantly improved the standard and quality of learning programmes offered to young children in disadvantaged communities.









Ntataise 2013 financial report


The operations of Ntataise showed growth of 1.3% in total expenditure in 2013, with the Ntataise NPC declining by 14%, while the continuing operations of the Ntataise Trust grew by 7.5% compared with the previous year. The reason for the decline in the activities of the NPC was that contracted funding from the Free State Department of Social Development did not materialise during the year. The major focus of the NPC is formal (Level 4) and skills training, while the Trust concentrates on support programmes for the Network, enrichment programmes for existing pre-schools, and the introduction of training programmes into new areas thus increasing access to pre-school education for children in disadvantaged rural communities.

Expenditure on training and support functions declined by 17%, largely the result of the delayed receipt of funding referred to above, but still constituted 56.6% of total expenditure. Expenditure on special projects declined by 10% due to the successful completion of a number of projects. This category amounted to 28% of total expenditure. Administration expenses were well controlled, and increased by only 3.7%, and amounted to 10.2% of total expenditure. Material development is now carried out in-house rather than being outsourced.

Total income remained at the same level as in 2012. Funds received grew by 7.4%, but this was offset by declines in course fees received and in interest earned.

Total investments and cash declined by 2.1% due to a decline of 17% in funds received in advance. Total assets also showed a small decline of 2.9%, while reserves grew by 3.6%. Investments and cash represent 15 months of actual expenses in 2013. In summary, the accounts indicate that Ntataise's financial position remains sound, and expenses are well controlled.


Analysis of Income 2013

Ntataise Network Support Programme

Director's Report

Jane Evans, Director Ntataise Network Support Programme

On the eve of twenty years of democracy in South Africa, the improvements we have seen in providing our nation's youngest children with the foundation they will require for lifelong learning, are noteworthy. As of 2010/11, government spending on education as a whole has been the largest single line item in the budget and ECD (Early Childhood Development) has received its share. With the support of government, civil society and donors, we have seen the establishment of community based ECD centres across the country with an ever increasing number of these sites registered with the Department of Social Development and receiving a subsidy. Access to ECD for children who are not able to attend a pre-school has gained significant attention over the past few years. A number of Ntataise Network members, have successfully implemented mobile playgroup programmes, toy libraries, home visiting programmes and parent support programmes. Private-public collaboration between government, civil society and donors has rendered some remarkable developments in ECD. One such example is the joint project between the Department of Social Development, Ilifa Labantwana, Ntataise and ELRU in the North West province which is now in its third year of implementation.

Yet despite these achievements, the need for good quality ECD programmes in disadvantaged communities is as great now as it was 33 years ago when Ntataise was founded. There are currently discussions in the industry examining ways and means of reaching greater numbers of children. One option being considered is the concept of social franchising. Ntataise's focus has always been on the provision of high quality programmes, and any plans for expansion should not result in a lowering of those standards.

At the centre of quality ECD programming are the ECD practitioners, be they pre-school practitioners, playgroup practitioners, family community motivators or toy librarians. Training for ECD practitioners is one of the crucial issues that needs ongoing attention.

With the bulk of government funding for practitioner training going to FET Colleges, much of this training will in future therefore focus on theoretical learning. Experience has shown that theoretical learning does not on its own translate into a quality programme in the playroom and that practitioners need regular on-site support and mentoring. Added to this there are still large numbers of practitioners who do not qualify for or simply cannot access an FET College.

Ntataise's commitment and that of its Network, to the provision of quality ECD training programmes for ECD practitioners as well as the development of appropriate ECD programming of a high standard for young children, has over the years had a profound impact on thousands of children and equipped them with the necessary foundation for lifelong learning. Over the past twenty years, in addition to increased government support, NGOs have continued to be a significant provider of ECD programmes. These organisations hold a wealth of knowledge, experience and expertise. It is important that the NGO sector works together with government and that the role of the NGOs should not be overlooked.

Ntataise would once again like to thank its team of Trustees, management, administration, training and housekeeping staff who have contributed to another successful year.

In memoriam

It was Nelson Mandela who said, "My dear young people: I see the light in your eyes, the energy of your bodies, and the hope that is in your spirit. I know it is you, not I, who will make the future. It is you, not I, who will fix our wrongs and carry forward all that is right with the world." As we at Ntataise mourn Madiba's passing, we rejoice in the love and compassion he had for this beloved country's children. Our deepest condolences go to his wife, Graça Machel and his family.

Burton Stern was Chairperson of Friends of South African Rural Pre-school Development in the USA. 

Ntataise Network Support Programme activities 2013

Organisational development and capacity building

This training and support provided to Network directors, trainers and staff in 2013, included:

- Human Resource workshops presented by Ronel Burger of Regenesys.
- · Monitoring and evaluation workshops for Network directors and senior staff were presented by Linda Biersteker of ELRU.
- A budgeting workshop was held with Network directors and administrative staff, facilitated by Sarah McGuigan of Ntataise and concentrated on effective budgeting essential for organisational planning and control.
- One-on-one sessions were held with Network organisations' leadership and provided practical hands-on support focused on fundraising and budgeting.
- Training of Network trainers focused on up-grading trainers' teaching skills. A short course for Ntatise Network trainers on how to teach adults was presented by Ursula Segers and Rafeekah Patel of ELRU.
- Ntataise Network members attended an Ntataise programme orientation workshop presented by Ntataise's Amanda Watermeyer.
- Ntataise Network directors were kept abreast of important developments in the ECD sector through quarterly director's meetings. These meetings addressed critical sector trends and organisational development.





Ha Re Baleng - Let's Read early literacy programme

This innovative project to improve early literacy levels of young children was extended to babies and toddlers between the ages of 0 and 2 years.

Thirteen Network organisations participated in the project. Each organisation received Baby and Toddler literacy kits. These kits consisted of specially selected books, toys, puzzles, puppets and musical instruments appropriate for babies and toddlers between

the ages of 0 and 2 years. The kits also contained a carry bag that enables community development practitioners and Enrichment Programme trainers to easily carry the resources they need when doing home or site visits.

Three comprehensive workshops were held for Network Enrichment trainers and community development practitioners with a focus on planning, organising and implementing integrated literacy programmes aimed at babies and toddlers using the arts as a vehicle for stimulation and development. These workshops were conducted by the Curriculum Development Project and the University of Pretoria with which Ntataise has worked for many years.

Support to ECD in the North West

The ground breaking public-private partnership between the North West Department of Social Development (DSD), Ilifa Labantwana, Ntataise and ELRU in the Kagisano- Molopo and Ganyesa municipalities of the North West province completed its third year of implementation.

In addition to practitioners, ECD training was extended to DSD social workers and auxiliary social workers in 2013. Ntataise worked with social workers and demonstrated how to support and monitor ECD sites. This collaborative work has enabled many ECD sites to be registered and/or receive a DSD subsidy, as well as assisted DSD to meet their targets and improve the quality of ECD services in the North West province.

In 2013, plans were developed to extend the project to further marginalised areas of the North West province.

Ntataise Network Conference

A record number of delegates attended the Ntataise 2013 Network Conference held at the Roodevallei Conference Centre in Pretoria. Amongst the 150 delegates were guests from the Department of Basic Education, the Department of Social Development, UNICEF and ECD funders. The Conference is an opportunity for members of the Ntataise Network along with funders and government to concentrate on development in the broader South African ECD field and to ensure each Network member's relevance in the field.

In her key note address, Marie-Louise Samuels, Director of Early Childhood Development, Department of Basic Education, emphasised that the future of ECD lies in combined and inclusive programmes, working together with government and business that cover the full range of the needs of children from conception to school age. "None of us can do it alone ... We have to look at mechanisms that allow us to work together," she said.

David Harrison, CEO of the DG Murray Trust, in his presentation on the concept of social franchising, highlighted the need for ECD NGOs to embrace a common vision and work together to provide a full range of age-differentiated services in an essential package for young children. "We have to find a way to understand good community practice, high quality services and find a way to incrementally expand the gamut of services that are provided. At the same time we have to develop models of large scale delivery through mechanism such as a franchise; some sort of solid brand with a high consistency of services."

Dr Juliana Seleti of UNICEF reiterated the idea of partnership to create a more comprehensive and valuable approach, saying "The value of partnership lies in combining complementary strengths of two or more parties, so as to achieve greater impact and synergy than when operating separately." Ms Shona Young of Trialogue, also noted in her address "CSI funding and the current funding situation" that "national projects receive the lion's share of CSI funding."

Ntataise Free State operations

Director's Report

Puleng Motsoeneng, Director Ntataise Free State operations

One of the most effective ways of improving the quality of education available to our children, is to improve adults understanding of the importance of a child's development in his/her early years. Over the past year parent involvement in various of the Ntataise programmes improved significantly.

For the past two years, in partnership with the Free State Department of Social Development, Ntataise piloted a mobile playgroup programme targeting pre-school children on farms who did not have access to ECD. A modified truck equipped with educational equipment and run by two experienced ECD practitioners held a weekly playgroup with children and their mothers on six farms in the Viljoenskroon district. In 2013 these women took it upon themselves to turn the weekly playgroup sessions into daily ECD programmes which they ran in a voluntary capacity. Ntataise provided educational toys and equipment and extra workshops for the women involved.

Parent participation in the Ntataise Mosupatsela playgroup programme also increased in 2013, as did parents attendance at the Ntataise Toy Library. This was as a result of Ntataise's intensified input with parents and a desire on the part of those parents who could not afford to send their children to a pre-school to become involved in their early development.

Practitioner training continued to be a priority and 95% of practitioners who enrolled in the Ntataise FETC:ECD level 4 programme in 2012, completed the programme in 2013, a significant achievement.

The ongoing training of Ntataise staff is paramount to ensuring that we continue to deliver quality programmes to those we work with. Ntataise training and administration staff participated in training programmes offered by the Ntataise Network Support Programme. Nthakoana Maseola and Sandra Mokwena completed their Diploma in ECD NQF Level 5. Aletta Matshediso graduated her National Professional Diploma in Education NQF Level 5.

In conclusion, special thanks must go to all Ntataise funders, without whose support we would not be able to achieve our objective of providing quality ECD programmes to the most vulnerable children in our communities.

Formal training programmes

Seventy-one ECD practitioners completed the Ntataise FETC:ECD Level 4 programme at the end of 2013. In 2013 a further 30 preschool practitioners from Bothaville, Kroonstad, Viljoenskroon, Vredefort and Parys started the programme.

The Ntataise Skills programme was specifically developed for practitioners who do not qualify for Level 4 training and carries credits towards a General Education and Training Certificate (GETC). In 2013, practitioners from pre-schools in Kroonstad and Steynsrus enrolled on the programme. They participated in six five-day workshops which focused on the cognitive and physical development needs of young children including health and nutrition.

Special training programmes included workshops for 78 practitioners working predominantly with babies and toddlers from preschools in Kroonstad, Odendaalsrus, Bothaville and Viljoenskroon. These workshops focused on developing practitioners' skills in caring for children in the 0 - 2 year age group. Ntataise also held a five-day Special Needs workshop for 50 practitioners from preschools in Kroonstad and Viljoenskroon. The objective of this workshop was to build the capacity and knowledge of practitioners to identify and support children with learning barriers.

Development programme

Improving learning in the playroom - Ntataise Enrichment Programme

The Ntataise Enrichment Programme is a vitally important mentoring and support programme which assists pre-school teachers who have completed level 4 training in implementing what they have learned and improving the learning environment for children in the playroom. Fourteen ECD practitioners participated in the Ntataise Enrichment Programme in 2013. Activities included workshops for practitioners coupled with on-site demonstration visits to pre-schools by an experienced Ntataise trainer. The outcome of this programme has been a considerable improvement in the daily programmes, activities and playroom layout at pre-schools. Children are more interactive and enjoy being at school and participating in activities that stretch their mental, physical and emotional development.





Community Outreach Programme

Two mobile playgroups and the Ntataise Toy Library make up the Ntataise Free State's community outreach programme. The objective of this programme is to increase access to play and learning opportunities for pre-school aged children not in a pre-school or home based ECD programme.

Ntataise mobile playgroup programme

Ntataise's two mobile playgroups include one reaching farm workers children on farms surrounding Viljoenskroon and another that operates in the township of Rammulotsi. In 2013, 93 pre-school aged children together with 55 of their parents/caregivers attended the Mosupatsela playgroup in Rammulotsi and 101 children with 82 parents/caregivers attended the farm mobile unit. A highlight of the programme was the increased enrolment and improved attendance of children as well as their parent / caregiver. Child attendance (up 58.5% on 2012 attendance figures) was consistent and regular and children continued to attend when parents were absent. Parent attendance was also significantly improved with a 46% increase in regular parent attendance in comparison to 2012. ECD facilitators also reported that parents were active in assisting to set-up the play area and during sessions openly discussed child development issues they were experiencing.





In particular this increased parent attendance has had a significant outcome for the farm mobile playgroup programme. Parents asked Ntataise to assist them to extend the programme and run it themselves. Six parents, one from each farm volunteered to run the playgroups. Ntataise ran a week long workshop for these volunteers and provided each with a kit of appropriate educational toys and equipment needed for a playgroup programme. In 2014, each of these volunteers will run a daily playgroup programme for the children and their parents on each farm. In 2014 the Ntataise farm mobile playgroup programme will be extended to a further 5 farms in the area of Viljoenskroon.

Ntataise Toy Library

In 2013 some 360 children registered with the Ntataise Toy Library. These children ranged in age from 2 to 12 years and included children who did not attend an ECD programme; children from the Mosupatsela playgroup; children attending pre-schools in Rammulotsi as well as primary school children living in Rammulotsi.

A new feature of the programme in 2013 were regular visits by 6 pre-schools in Rammulotsi. These pre-schools have limited educational toys and equipment and these sessions provided children with the opportunity to play with the age-appropriate toys, games, puzzles and art material available at the toy library.

Parent support workshops

In 2013 Ntataise introduced and held quarterly support workshops for parents of the children who attend the Mosupatsela playgroup programme and the Ntataise Toy Library. Workshop topics included child development; child nutrition; "Me and my child's needs"; and how to identify signs of child abuse and where to find support systems. These workshops were well attended with an average of 40 parents attending each workshop.
